Master's Degree in Migration Studies: Governance, Policies and Cultures

The University of Tunis El Manar, the University of La Manouba, and the University of Tunis are pleased to announce the **fifth call for applications** to their **Joint International Research Master's Programme in Migration Studies: Governance, Policies and Cultures**, open to both **Tunisian and international students** for the academic year **2025–2026**.

Launched within the framework of the **Erasmus+ Capacity Building MIGRANTS Project**, this pioneering programme brings together a dynamic partnership of Tunisian institutions with European universities and international organisations, including the **University of Palermo (Italy)**, **University of Granada (Spain)**, **University of Westminster (UK)**, **UNIMED**, **COSPE**, and **CLEDU**.

High-performing students enrolled in this programme are eligible for a **double degree** awarded by the Tunisian partner universities and the **University of Palermo**. They also have the opportunity to participate in **Erasmus+ mobility exchanges** with prestigious institutions such as **Uppsala University (Sweden)**, **Hogeschool Utrecht (Netherlands)**, and **Pompeu Fabra University (Spain)**.

More recently, the Master's in Migration Studies has joined the **AICS-funded CDN Project**: *"Promoting Sustainable Human Development through the Consolidation and Expansion of the Cooperation and Development Network: Cooperating in Higher Education to Cooperate for Development"*. This global initiative, led by the **University of Pavia (Italy)**, includes partner institutions from **Kenya, Colombia, Nepal, Albania, Palestine** and **Tunisia**. Through this collaboration, students will benefit from a wide range of **international learning opportunities**, including **internships, training programmes**, and **academic mobilities**.
